Overview

The Maryland Department of Health's Developmental Disabilities Administration (DDA) Waiver Advisory Council was created to bring together people who have used Medicaid waiver home and community-based services, as well as other interested groups. The goal is to help improve the DDA-operated Medicaid waiver home and community-based services programs. The Waiver Advisory Council gives advice and ideas to the DDA to help make services better.

What the Council Does

The Council provides input on important areas such as:

- How DDA-operated Medicaid waiver programs are designed.
- · How services are delivered and accessed by people.
- · Federal rules that the DDA must follow.
- · Improving access to Medicaid services (Access Rule).
- · Strategies to make sure services continue to improve.



Who Is Part of the Council?

The Waiver Advisory Council includes people who have used DDA services, like current or past participants and self-advocates. Other members include family members, DDA providers, advocacy groups and representatives from different Maryland agencies.

How the Council Works

The Council meets every two months in person, with a virtual option using Google Meet. Meetings are open to the public, and anyone can attend. Agendas and meeting details are shared before each meeting. The Council follows a process where every voice matters, and everyone works together to find solutions.
