




# STI Forum is unique in the UN

- Brought STI debate back to UN headquarters after decades!
  - Recognizes special role of STI. Took 4 years of MS deliberations,
     2011-2015
  - GA-mandated: Addis Ababa Action Agenda (§123), 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development (§70), STI and rapid tech resolutions.
- But "Multi-stakeholder":
  - Member States, civil society, private sector, scientific and technological communities, UN system,...
  - Beyond UN "major group" system: Engages many new stakeholders (not usually engaged with UN)
  - Speakers primarily scientists and engineers from academia, private sector and NGOs who engage with MS, including Ministers. No hierarchy between participants.
- 10-Member-Group has broad mandate on STI for SDGs. Not just advisory group, but directly engaged. Primary substantive responsibility for sessions, supported by Secretariat and IATT.

- IATT as a new one-UN way of working
  - Working-level cooperation among expert STI staff across the UN system they self-organize their work.
  - Volunteer work, underfunded. IATT coordinators can rotate.
  - DESA as the SG's Department ultimately responsible to deliver.

### Political ownership:

- Oversight through 2 co-chairs appointed by ECOSOC President (previously one PR, one national science advisor).
- No negotiations, no need for consensus. Exchange on issues of concern and solutions suggested by STI stakeholders.
- Inclusive space and science-policy interface what does it offer scientific and technological communities?
  - Good faith substantive engagement, not the place for institutional politics. Focus on policy solutions and tech solutions.
  - Anyone can submit science-policy brief or organize a side event (only subject to peer-review/quality control).

## **Preparations to-date**

- ➤ 10-Member-Group:
  - Discussions since summer 2022
  - Discussion of vision and elements of a global STI4SDG roadmap
  - Broadly defined thematic sessions and special events, proposed keynote speakers, and discussed and follow-up
  - Various proposals, policy briefs and reports.
- Forum Co-chairs and their teams:
  - Regular meetings with IATT coordinators since Oct.
  - Welcomed sessions proposed by 10-Members (20 Jan.)
  - 1<sup>st</sup> MS briefing on 13 Jan
- > IATT
  - Call for substantive inputs in 5 UN languages (Russian speaker volunteers?): (abstracts by 3 Feb., draft submissions by 10 March)
  - Established Forum task force (STI Africa day, etc.)
  - IATT work in work streams

## **Respective roles**

- The STI Forum co-chairs provide overall political ownership and rally support, approve overall programme
- <u>The 10-Member-Group</u> provides overall substantive ownership, moderate the Forum sessions, and explore initiatives and partnerships.
- The interagency IATT (47 UN entities, currently led by DESA and UNCTAD) provides organizational and substantive expert support.
- <u>Secretariat</u> reviews and finalizes concept note, programme, notes, and speaker list. Ultimately responsible for delivery and filling of any gaps.

# Objectives of our meeting

- Mid-term review of STI progress for the SDGs (overall, and in-focus SDGs 6, 7, 9 and 11)
- Discuss future vision and elements of a global STI4SDGs roadmap
- Identify high-impact innovations and technology solutions in key SDG areas
- Take stock of the TFM: 10-Member-Group and IATT since 2015
- Help conceptualizing the substantive focus and documentation for the STI Forum 2023

## **Expected outputs of our meeting**

- Detailed meeting report with sufficient information to help finalizing the STI Forum concept note and programme
- Substantive materials/feedback for the 10-Member-Group to complete their vision and global STI4SDGs roadmap
- Compilation of written STI proposals and of high-impact innovations and technology solutions in key SDG areas
- Stock take of the TFM since 2015
