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WRITTEN DECLARATION

submitted under Rule 136 of the Rules of Procedure on the promotion of multilingualism in the European Union

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Written declaration, under Rule 136 of Parliament's Rules of Procedure, on the promotion of multilingualism in the European Union¹

- 1. Multilingualism has been an official EU policy since the Barcelona European Council in 2002. Poor language skills and the exclusive promotion of a particular language can be a factor in Europe's current social crisis, i.e. by increasing intolerance and prejudice. leading to the rise of extremist political parties.
- 2. There are over 50 million speakers of regional, minority and non-official languages in the Member States and some 40 million immigrants using non-European languages, such as Turkish, Arabic, Russian and Chinese.
- 3. Language rights, both individual and collective, are fundamental human rights, which promote equal opportunities for all citizens.
- 4. Language competence is a crucial factor in professional competence and in fostering mobility. Border regions have special needs and merit particular attention.
- 5. By promoting multilingualism and the use of minority and non-official languages the EU is protecting and promoting cultural diversity, which is a key European value.
- 6. The Commission is hence called upon to raise awareness of the benefits of multilingualism and multiculturalism among European institutions and citizens, and to adopt a systematic approach to the preservation and protection of minority languages and cultures.
- 7. This declaration, together with the names of the signatories, is forwarded to the Commission.
