Written declaration, under Rule 136 of Parliament's Rules of Procedure, on tackling the challenges presented by the Global Hunger Index¹

- 1. According to the 2015 Global Hunger Index (GHI), the level of hunger in developing countries has fallen by 27 % since 2000. 17 countries reduced their hunger scores by 50 % or more relative to the 2000 GHI scores.
- 2. Despite the progress made, levels of hunger remain 'serious' or 'alarming' in 52 of the 117 countries covered.
- 3. 795 million people are still chronically undernourished; more than one in four children is affected by stunting, and 9 % of children are affected by wasting.
- 4. The countries with the highest GHI scores tend to be those engaged in, or which have recently emerged from, war.
- 5. Accordingly, the Commission and the Council are called upon to:
 - scale up efforts to address the root causes of refugee migration, and ensure that those efforts are needs-based and leave no-one behind:
 - pay special attention to food and nutrition security in fragile countries, this being both the cause and consequence of conflicts;
 - focus on the implementation of Sustainable Development Goal 16 on peace and justice in order to create the necessary conditions to accomplish the zero hunger goal.
- 6. This declaration, together with the names of the signatories, is forwarded to the Council and the Commission.

¹ Under Rule 136(4) and (5) of Parliament's Rules of Procedure, where a declaration is signed by a majority of Parliament's component Members, it is published in the minutes with the names of its signatories and forwarded to the addressees, without however binding Parliament.
