Subject: Mexican national security strategy under government headed by President

Sheinbaum

As I reported in my question E-002382/2024¹, the reckless refusal of Mexican President Claudia Sheinbaum to start a full war on drugs could increase impunity for drug traffickers and cause a steep rise in murders (which hit 190 000 during AMLO's term of office).

The government is welcoming the initial results of its 'zero impunity' national security strategy², even though insecurity in Mexico is still beating records according to European standards.

- 1. In the Vice-President/High Representative's view, is Mexico doing enough to tackle its insecurity and crime problems?
- 2. In the information that the government has shared with me, EU Member States (including Spain and Italy) stand accused of being the exporters of 30 % of the illicit weapons seized during Sheinbaum's first month in government. Does the Vice-President/High Representative's take the view that those allegations are well grounded and that 30 % of the illicit weapons seized are indeed of European origin?
- 3. Does the Vice-President/High Representative's believe that Sheinbaum's refusal to engage in a war on drugs could undermine the cooperation programme on drugs (COPOLAD³) and/or the programme against transnational crime (EL PAcCTO⁴)?
