Subject: Big Tech's non-compliance with European internet rules: DSA Audit Reports

According to reports<sup>1</sup> in NRC, a Dutch newspaper, except for Wikipedia, none of the other 18 Very Large Online Platforms and Very Large Online Search Engines comply with the Digital Services Act<sup>2</sup> (DSA), based on their audited reports published this week. It is now nearly a year and a half since these platforms' obligations under the DSA came into force in August 2023, so this situation is very disappointing, to say the least.

- 1. Will the Commission gather and publish these audits on a single website to enhance public transparency?
- 2. Will the Commission soon respond to these published audited reports and the performance of the platforms individually and publicly?
- 3. How will the information in the audited reports be followed up on and what action will the Commission take to put a stop, as soon as possible, to this broad non-compliance with the various transparency and safety obligations in the DSA?
