## Question for written answer E-000054/2025 to the Commission Rule 144 Lynn Boylan (The Left)

Subject: Overbooking of passenger flights

Overbooking by airlines leads to passengers being denied boarding, causing huge disruption and distress.

In response to a citizen's petition in January 2024<sup>1</sup>, the Commission said it has no plans to tackle the issue of overbooking, as it affects only small numbers of passengers. This assessment is based on a report<sup>2</sup> which assesses data provided by airlines on overbooking from 2014 to 2018. The report notes that: 'As Ryanair, which in recent years has represented close to 10 % of total EU passenger traffic, has a stated policy of not overbooking flights (and there is no evidence to suggest otherwise), we have also reduced each of the denied boarding proportions by 10 %.'

My correspondence with constituents, and any simple online search, reveals that Ryanair does overbook flights, despite its stated policy. In view of this:

- 1. Is the Commission confident that an assessment based only on airline data and statements accurately reflects the impact of overbooking on passengers?
- 2. Does the Commission have any plans to reassess the impact of overbooking on passengers, considering more up-to-date and complimentary data sources, such as input from consumer protection bodies and complaints about overbooking made to national enforcement bodies?
