Subject: Recognising the environmental value of sustainable hunting

Hunting, often confused with poaching and subject to attempts to have it restricted/banned, is a practice that can have a positive impact on the environment if it is carried out in keeping with the law and in a sustainable manner.

Hunters devote a lot of time and attention to the countryside and habitats, restoring and clearing paths, removing rubbish, and checking and cleaning ditches in often deserted, neglected areas.

Hunting also plays a key role in controlling animal populations: selective culling maintains ecological balances and prevents damage to habitats. It also helps protect habitats from invasive species by stopping them from spreading.

A study conducted by the association Nomisma estimated hunting's environmental value to be EUR 8.5 billion per year<sup>1</sup>.

In view of the above:

- 1. Does the Commission not consider it appropriate to recognise the positive value of ethical and sustainable hunting, in view of Directive 92/43/EEC, which stipulates that the preservation, protection and improvement of the environment and the conservation of natural habitats are 'an essential objective of general interest'?
- 2. Does it not agree that policies aimed at limiting or banning hunters' activities can potentially be detrimental to environmental protection and habitat conservation?
