

Each year, at the Château de Tocqueville, the home where Alexis de Tocqueville wrote his magnum opus "Democracy in America", the Tocqueville Foundation, in partnership with Le Figaro and the Atlantic Council, hosts a two-days conference on the challenges that our liberal democracies are increasingly facing.

In this stunning and symbolic venue we bring together personalities from very different geographical, intellectual and political backgrounds (heads of state, leading political figures and opponents, economic decision-makers, intellectuals, artists, whether French, European, American or others), who may not have been able, or willing to meet, and thus shed new light on contemporary issues.

The Tocqueville Conversations aim to initiate a collective search for solutions and consensus between various opinions, and our Foundation also attaches particular importance to the participation of the younger generations in the debates, so that they can discover, invest in and make their voices heard on subjects of crucial importance for their future.

After exploring in recent years, the crisis of Western democracy in the 21st century, the future of nations, the crisis of American democracy, and the Russian question in the age of Putin's war, our 2023 edition will focus on the major upheavals that Europe is facing today.

The war in Ukraine has already changed Europe. The return of Russian imperialism, the fragility of our democracies, the stunning emergence of Ukraine as a major force and the shift of Europe's center of gravity to the East, all strongly underline the need for the Union to re-evaluate its common security architecture, its relationship with the United States, its vision of its eastern border, and to finally settle the question of Soviet totalitarianism that remained unresolved after 1991. In essence, we need to rethink Europe as well as the internal social contracts of our democracies.

In 2023, the Conversations will be held on June 30th and July 1st, on the theme "Tomorrow's Europe: Rearming Democracy" and we are looking forward to welcoming you.



In the fall of 2017, informed by her work on the « Trumpian popular revolt » during the Trump campaign, and then by numerous trips throughout a Europe swept by similar rebellions, Laure Mandeville, Senior reporter with Le Figaro, France's oldest national daily, envisioned a grand-scale conference on the crisis of Democracy in the West. Understanding the significance of the writings of Alexis de Tocqueville in our current crisis, she reaches out to Jean Guillaume de Tocqueville, President of The Tocqueville Foundation, whose mission is to keep alive the work and spirit of his renowned ancestor and to promote civil society initiatives. Concurrently, Le Figaro, which has become a leading force in examining the causes of our democratic crisis, decides to bring its intellectual resources to the project. On the other side of the Atlantic, they join forces with Joshua Mitchell, professor of political theory at Georgetown University and a leading expert on Tocqueville; and with Vice President Damon Wilson, Ambassador Craig Stapleton and Former minister of Foreign Affairs of Spain Ana Palacio at the Atlantic Council. The region Normandy and the Departement of La Manche, where the Tocqueville Château is situated, also become key partners for the event. The Tocqueville Conversations are born.
