

Route Setters Assessment

1 Criteria for evaluation

Identification of Route Setters levels and possible certification is based on five main criteria:

- Creativity
- Setting for the right purpose
- Safety requirements (access procedure and PPE)
- Organisation
- Work Ethic

1.1 Creativity

This is the ability for the route setter to engage with the competitors and the crowd through sequence and aesthetics.

- The general look of the climb and the actual execution of certain movements by competitors is very important for the crowds involvement in the competition
- More creative sequences and movements also helps challenging problem solving and reading skills of competitors

1.2 Setting for the right purpose

This is a route setter's ability to meet the route description/brief of the head setter. The level of quality and precision required in competition is high and challenged by time restraints, pressure to achieve a high standard and also the difficulty to set on an unknown wall with new features and holds. A few elements to consider are:

- How close is a route from being ultimately functional for its purpose after setting
- Level of tweaking and chipping required
- Understanding of splitting competitors, consistent and/or increased difficulty
- Understanding of the competition rules and holds numbering
- Understanding and/or knowledge of the competitors that will climb the route

1.3 Safety requirements (access procedure and PPE)

Following safety standards and procedures is extremely important for competition setting. This is mainly due to the fact that the level of stress, restricted timeframe and possible fatigue may lead to mistakes.

- Remain tidy in the working area
- Use of PPE when required
- Understanding of safety procedure
- Follow access procedures (redundancy, scissor lift and rope access)





1.4 General organisation and efficiency

- Correct selection of equipment and access method (scissor, static, ground anchor, ladder)
- Remain organized with tools
- Efficiency to set a route
- Arrive on time at work
- Understand scheduling and time requirement during the setting and the event

1.5 Work ethic

In competitions this is critical as the team finds itself pushing huge hours striving to achieve perfection in each route. A few lazy setters in the team can really apply an extra amount of work on other setters during the setting week and during the event days.

- Amount of work willing to provide
- Level of perfection intended and time to offer
- Interest in setting at a high standard and serving the right purpose
- Sharing experiences and knowledge
- Offering positive feedback to other setters
- Motivation, good manner, team spirit and enthusiasm to other team members
